

Enrichment Strategy: Identifying and Giving Examples

"Teacher, May I?"
Homophones, Homonyms, and Homographs

This offline enrichment strategy helps students practice identifying and giving examples of homophones, homonyms, and homographs. This activity is best completed after students have had a chance to play the online Featured Games for Homophones, homonyms, and homographs.

Goal: To help students recognize homophones, homonyms, and homographs.

What You'll Need:

- Printer
- Word cards (108)

What To Do:

- 1. Print and cut the word cards
- Distribute 3 cards to each student.
- 3. Tell the students that the object of the game is to reach you by asking questions that correctly use the words on their cards.
- 4. Have students line up side by side several steps away from you, while you stand in the front of the room.
- 5. The first student to raise his/her hand may ask the question. Each question begins "Teacher may I..." and goes on to use a homophone. For example, if the word is "store," the student may ask, "Teacher may I go to the store?" or "Teacher may I store some food?"
- 6. If the student uses the word correctly, he/she may move forward one step. If the student has used the word incorrectly, he/she takes one step back.
- 7. Students who reach the teacher in the first round may participate in a play-off round.
